A NOTE FROM THE BOARD PRESIDENT

The handrail on the clubhouse stairs has been replaced, making it safer. We have renewed our Lawn Service contract for the upcoming year at an increase of 10%. The biggest reason for this increase is the price of gasoline followed by the need by our contractor to raise wages to keep good people. Even at this increase it is thousands less than last year's bids by three other lawn service companies who submitted bids to us. With this increase as well as increases in utilities, management fees, cable tv & internet, termite warranties, as well as the cost of a state-required professional audit, our yearly expenses have increased by about \$25,000. One of the few items where we were able to reduce our cost was for insurance. With a 25 to 30% increase in insurance projected, we were looking at \$136,000 for insurance for the coming year. The decision was made to shop this on the open market with three different agents, our current agent included. We were able to obtain the same coverage with a different agent for \$102,318, or \$3,000 LESS THAN LAST YEAR'S PREMIUM. The new company was vetted by myself and property manager Bob Kelly and found to be one of the five most financially sound insurance companies in the state. With all things considered we have no choice but to increase our monthly fees by \$20.00 per unit, which will generate \$26,400 in revenue to cover the aforementioned \$25,000 shortage to our yearly cost to operate the Village.

Tim Murray Tree service will be in the Village on Tuesday, November 2nd, to trim our trees. Palm trees will be trimmed soon by our lawn service company. Please cooperate if you are asked to move a vehicle so they may do their job. Also, workers will be fixing the depression in the road in front of Unit 104 on November 9th.

NEWS FROM THE PC WHISPERER

Hi! Bob Moore (your PC Whisperer) here with some news. Or maybe you've heard... Bill Gates has thrown us, PC users, a bit of a curve. If you've visited the Windows Update page in your computer recently, you may have seen this very unambiguous message:

"This PC doesn't currently meet all the system requirements for Windows 11"

Windows 11? What in heaven's name is that!

Didn't Gates, not long ago, promise us that there would be no newly numbered versions of Microsoft's flagship Operating System, that Windows 10 would just continue to get better and better from now on?

Well *Poof!* to that fond hope. Here we go again.

But don't despair. If you don't see the message above on your Windows Update page, your PC is ready for version 11 whenever you are. If you do see it, your PC may simply need some tweaking to get ready. In either case, the switch from Windows 10 to Windows 11 won't be nearly as gnarly as the switch from Windows 7 to Windows 8 was and nothing like the switch from Windows 8 or 8.1 to Windows 10 either.

In fact, if you're fully up to date and using Windows 10 today, you'll continue to have Microsoft's unwavering support until October of 2025, even though version 11 is available as we speak. And even then, as Microsoft's Windows 10 support winds down, the switch to Windows 11 will be both entirely yours to schedule at your convenience and *free!*

You'll probably want to install version 11 sooner or later but, in short, there's no rush. Windows 10 will continue to serve you well both before and after October 2025. Heck, some of us are still happily using Windows 7.

True, using an older, no-longer-supported version of Windows comes with a bit of additional risk to those of us who hippity hop around on the web in search of this or that. Malware (the internet's version of Covid) is never more than a click of the mouse away and remains the best of all reasons to use the latest, defensively updated operating system.

But even if Microsoft has told you that your PC does not meet "system requirements" for Windows 11, you won't likely have to chuck it and buy a new one. Find everything you might want to know about how to upgrade to version 11 whenever you're ready here....

Lucy Gambino, who lives in Unit 902, was born in New York City and grew up in a traditional "old school" Italian family in the Bronx. She had one brother. Her mother worked as a seamstress and her father had his own fruit and vegetable business.

She attended Washington Irving High School on 14th Street near Union Square. She was accepted into a custom design course, focusing on pattern making, millinery and drapery. During her senior year she did a work/study apprenticeship with the private dress designer Maria Sandi, creating one-of-a-kind high-end ladies clothing.

After graduation she got a job at The American Bank Note Company. The company printed foreign currency and tax stamps. Her job was to inspect the finished design for imperfections.

She met the love of her life, Gabe, while shoveling snow on George Washington's Birthday (Feb 22, 1948). Both Gabe and Lucy's families were "Paisans" (good family friends), and Lucy recalls being at family gatherings that Gabe also attended before they formally met later in life and started their courtship. They married 2 years later. Gabe worked as a TV repairman and eventually he started his own business. Lucy continued working until they started their own family. They have 3 children: Elaine, Lucille and Patrick, 4 grandchildren and 7 great-grandchildren which she refers to as "The Magnificent Seven". Gabe and Lucy were married for 71 years before he passed in December 2020.

In 1978 they moved to a single-family home in St. Petersburg. Many of their family members had moved to Florida. She says, "They couldn't take the winters any longer!" While residing in St. Pete, Gabe worked at Economy T.V. and she worked at Cloth World.

In 2010 they downsized and moved to Raintree Village. They dove right into their new community and Gabe was often called "the Mayor of RTV." For a few years she was the Chair of the Social Committee helping to organize and cook for the clubhouse parties.

Together they loved traveling, especially road trips to Las Vegas and Biloxi. Lucy likes to gamble! Her hobbies are word puzzles, reading (she always has a new book in the house and in her car), and sewing for friends and family. She is still involved with the social committee, plays shuffleboard and Marbles Pursuit.

**RAINTREE VILLAGE BOARD OF DIRECTORS
Minutes of Meeting of Tuesday, October 19, 2021**

Call to Order and Roll Call:

The regular meeting of the Board of Directors was held on Tuesday, October 19, 2021 at the clubhouse. President Dan Cottle opened the meeting at 7:00 p.m. Vice President Betty McClure, and Directors Deedee Street, Barbara Masson, Ralph Memoli, Chuck Sambol and Sherri Fiore were present. Secretary to the Board Carol Machael was present. Manager Bob Kelly was present. The meeting had been posted in accordance with Florida statutes; a quorum was noted.

Review/Approval of Minutes

Minutes had been distributed to the Board members at least 48 hours in advance of the meeting. Minutes of the September meeting were approved after having waived the reading with a motion by Masson, seconded by Street, passed unanimously.

Reports

Tenant Owner Committee Report – Lucy Tirabassi reported that one interview is scheduled, and one unit is occupied and for sale while three units are unoccupied and not for sale.

Treasurer's Report – Mike Dugan reported income of \$50,824 with operating expenses of \$135,391. This expense includes the insurance expense for the year (\$102,319) which had been accrued and is due annually on October 1. Year to date net is \$541.

Cottle stated that, in view of the fact that insurance rates were scheduled to rise sharply, he had contacted three companies in order to keep RTV expenses in check. Franklin Hamilton Inc was selected to provide insurance with coverage consistent with past coverage at \$3000 less than was paid this year. Manager Bob Kelly supported this choice stating that his vetting of the company indicated that they were a company with a good track record.

The proposed budget for 2022 was presented and due to increased labor expenses from landscaping company and utilities, there is a projected increase of \$26,000 over last year. This would necessitate an HOA increase of \$20/mo.

Grounds/Landscaping Report – Sambol reported that Dave's Landscaping is increasing their contract amount by 10% as they have had trouble maintaining workers and have had to increase wages from about \$14/hr to \$18. He will meet with them to discuss things that are not being done. McClure moved and Street seconded to accept the contract for the next year with an increase of \$4500. Unanimous.

Building Maintenance – Cottle reported that the handrail on the clubhouse steps had been replaced. Murray's Tree Service will be on site November 2 to trim trees. He also stated that three trees need to be removed and that the palms will be trimmed by the landscapers.

Manager's Report – Bob Kelly stated that he meets with the board weekly and helped with budget preparations.

Old Business - None**New Business**

Request by #2402 to install a water softening system. This is an outdoor system at a price, excluding labor, of \$649. Fiore moved to approve with a second by McClure. Motion passed 5-1, with a nay vote by Memoli.

Request by #502 to add screening to the roof for leaf control. After enumeration of specific items in the by-laws the request was denied with a motion by Masson and second by Sambol. Unanimous.

Announcements / Audience Comments

The birthday bbq's continue to be held on the second Tuesday of each month.

There is an organization meeting for the Village Holiday Party on October 20 at 1:30.

Adjournment

Masson moved and Fiore seconded to adjourn the meeting at 7:58 pm.
